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## **Art. 1**

### **Object**

1. These Didactic Regulations govern the organisational aspects of the CdS in Modern European Languages, Cultures and Literatures (class L-11). The CdS in Modern European Languages, Cultures and Literatures is hinged in the Department of Humanities.
2. The CdS is governed by the Didactic Coordination Commission (CCD), pursuant to Art. 4 of the RDA. Additionally, pursuant to Art. 4 of the University Didactic Regulations, a Sub-Commission for Didactic Coordination of the Degree Program in Modern European Languages, Cultures, and Literatures has been established, approved with decision-making powers by the Department Council on January 15, 2020 (see Minutes no. 01/2020 of the Department Council).
3. The Didactic Regulations are issued in compliance with the relevant legislation in force, the Statute of the University of Naples Federico II, and the RDA.

## **Art. 2**

### **Training objectives**

The educational project of the Degree Program is set in the intercultural context of multicultural and multilingual European societies. It aims to provide qualifications that are applicable at the national, European, and international levels in view of employment and professional opportunities, as foreseen by the class, in the sectors of cultural services, publishing, cultural institutions, foreign language teaching in vocational training, businesses and commercial activities, diplomatic and consular representations, cultural tourism, and cultural mediation, as well as the training of development operators in multi-ethnic and multicultural contexts. It can also serve as a first level and foundation for higher university education paths in the fields of foreign languages, cultures, and literatures, including preparation for teaching for graduate students who will have sufficient credits in the appropriate groups of sectors and who, as provided by current legislation, will be able to participate in the admission tests for secondary education teacher training. The training is particularly focused on the modern and contemporary ages. Based on the knowledge of Italian literature and general linguistics, the core of knowledge, skills, and abilities acquired in a continuous and organic process over all three years consists of in-depth knowledge of two of the four European cultures and literatures offered by the Degree Program, in addition to Italian, and, in addition to general linguistics, of the linguistics of the respective languages, assuming practical linguistic-communicative skills (written and oral) at a C1 level of the European framework. In an interdisciplinary and comparative perspective, students must, on one hand, have an overview of the most important linguistic theories and methodologies, both in general and concerning the linguistics of two of the four languages, and, on the other hand, have an in-depth knowledge of the history of the two related literatures, in addition to Italian; these include the related cultures, as well as the development of literary genres and literary analysis methodologies. To complete the basic knowledge, students must have in-depth knowledge of historiography or geography, acquired in the second year of study. To integrate the modernist core of the studies, in the second year of studies students must choose between historical-philological subjects, such as Romance linguistics and philology, Germanic philology, or Latin language and literature, while in the third year, foreign language courses are offered from a historical-comparative perspective. As an alternative to the latter,

in the third year, along with free choices by students, a wide range of complementary and related subjects are also offered, ranging from literary and cultural fields to linguistic fields, the history of philosophy, and language teaching. To achieve the above-described objectives, students will follow the Study Plan outlined in the Didactic Regulations.

### **Art. 3**

#### **Professional profile and work opportunities**

- Foreign language correspondents and related professions

Functions in a work context:

The professions included in this unit provide administrative services, collaborating with the management of a company or organization in maintaining relations with foreign countries, engaging in telephone conversations, using technical or specific languages, drafting correspondence, documents, minutes, and taking notes in a foreign language.

Associated skills:

This profession requires a deep knowledge of foreign languages and cultures.

- Business correspondent, international fair and exhibition operator  
Corporate correspondent, operator of international fairs and exhibitions  
Hospitality technicians and related professions

Function in a work context:

The professions classified in this unit assist specialists, i.e. they apply knowledge in the field of tourism marketing to enhance, market, integrate the tourist offer of a territory or a territorial system; they collaborate with public and private entities to improve, characterize the tourist offer in organized and informal circuits on an environmental, artistic, architectural, food and wine level.

Skills associated with the function:

For this profession, non-superficial knowledge of foreign languages and cultures is necessary.

Career opportunities:

Tourism promotion bodies, hotels and other accommodation facilities, travel agencies, tour operators.

- Organizers of fairs, exhibitions and cultural events

Function in a work context:

The professions classified in this unit provide services for the organization and management of trade fairs; they place the available exhibition spaces and environments, organize their use by the public and exhibitors.

Skills associated with the function:

For this profession, non-superficial knowledge of foreign languages and cultures is necessary.

Career opportunities:

Agencies for trade fair services and other events, museums and other cultural institutions.

- Organizers of conferences and receptions

Function in a work context:

The professions classified in this unit organize international conferences, conferences and receptions, guaranteeing hospitality, sociality and services to the participants.

Skills associated with the function:

For this profession, non-superficial knowledge of foreign languages and cultures is necessary.

Career opportunities:

Conference service agencies, cultural institutions, accommodation institutions.

- Tourist entertainers and similar professions

Function in a work context:

The professions classified in this unit entertain guests of tourist villages, hotels and other accommodation facilities; they plan and organize leisure activities, games, competitions, parties, shows, lessons on the practice of dances, sports and body care activities, artistic and craft activities.

Skills associated with the function:

For this profession, non-superficial knowledge of foreign languages and cultures is necessary.

Career opportunities:

Tourist entertainer.

- Travel agents

Function in a work context:

The professions included in the unit propose, organize and sell tourist, business or other trips and any hotel accommodation to interested customers; they propose, advise, promote and exchange tourist packages on the market; plan and organize tourist activities for agencies, tourist offices, institutions and organizations.

Skills associated with the function:

For this profession, non-superficial knowledge of geography, foreign languages and cultures is required.

Career opportunities:

Travel agencies and similar facilities.

## Art. 4

### Admission requirements and knowledge required for access to the Degree Program<sup>1</sup>

To be admitted to the Degree Program in Modern European Languages, Cultures, and Literatures, students must have a high school diploma or another qualification obtained abroad that is recognized as suitable.

Students must also possess the prerequisites concerning knowledge of the humanities in the relevant and basic disciplinary areas, as well as adequate writing and oral communication skills.

In addition, the ability to understand and correctly express in written and oral form an Italian text of medium length, related to one of the basic disciplines of the Degree Program, is required, as well as the ability to participate in a conversation regarding the basic disciplines foreseen by the Degree Program.

Prospective students will take an evaluation test, possibly online, aimed at providing general indications of the student's aptitude for the chosen studies and the state of the basic knowledge required.

The outcome of this test is indicative for students but is not binding for admission.

If the assessment is negative, the student must fulfill the Additional Formative Obligations (OFA) prepared by the Degree Program.

## **Art. 5**

### **Procedures for access to the Degree Program (CdS)**

1. The CCD of the Degree Program normally regulates the admission criteria and any scheduling of enrolments, except in cases subject to different provisions of law<sup>2</sup>.
2. In the event of negative assessment of the adequate initial preparation regarding knowledge requirements for admission to the Degree Program, the CCD assigns specific Additional Formative Obligations (OFA), indicating the means of verification to be fulfilled within the Program's first year.

## **Art. 6**

### **Teaching activities and university training credit (Teaching activities and CFU)**

Each training activity, prescribed by the CdS detail sheet, is measured in CFU. Each CFU corresponds to 25 hours of overall training commitment<sup>3</sup> per student and includes the hours of teaching activities specified in the curriculum as well as the hours reserved for personal study or other individual training activities.

For the Degree Program covered by these Regulations, the teaching hours for each credit, established based on the type of training activity, are as follows, divided into 6 and 12 University Training Credits (CFU) modules:

Each CFU corresponds to five hours of lectures.

The CFU assigned to linguistic training activities with a high practical content (exercises/reading classes) provide for a ratio of 1 CFU to 20 hours of activity.

Therefore,

6 CFU modules correspond to 30 hours of lectures;

12 CFU modules correspond to 60 hours of lectures.

12 CFU modules of foreign language and linguistics are structured as follows:

In the first and second years:

6 CFU for a total of 30 hours of lectures, accompanied inseparably by 6 CFU of linguistic training activities with a high practical content (exercises/reading classes) for a total of 120 additional hours.

In the third year:

6 CFU for a total of 30 hours of lectures, accompanied by practical textual exercises and laboratory work for a total of 120 additional hours.

For internship activities, each credit corresponds to 25 hours of overall training commitment<sup>4</sup>.

The CFU corresponding to each training activity acquired by the student is awarded by satisfying the assessment procedures (examination, pass mark) indicated in the Course sheet relating to the course/activity attached to these Didactic Regulations.

## **Art. 7**

### **Description of teaching methods**

The didactic activity is carried out in presential modality.

If necessary, the CCD decides which courses also include teaching activities offered online.

Some courses may also take place in seminar form and/or involve classroom exercises, language, and computer laboratories.

Detailed information on how each course is conducted can be found in the course sheets.

## **Art. 8**

### **Testing of training activities<sup>5</sup>**

1. The CCD, within the prescribed regulatory limits<sup>6</sup>, establishes the number of examinations and other means of assessment that determine the acquisition of credits. Examinations are individual and may consist of written, oral, practical, graphical tests, term papers, interviews, or a combination of these modes.
2. The examination procedures published in the course sheets and the examination schedule will be made known to students before the start of classes on the Department's website.<sup>7</sup>
3. Examinations are held subject to booking, which is made electronically. In case the student is unable to book an exam for reasons that the President of the Board considers justifiable, the student may still be admitted to the examination, following those students already booked.
4. Before examination, the President of the Board of Examiners verifies the identity of the student, who must present a valid photo ID.
5. Examinations are marked out of 30. Examinations involving an assessment out of 30 shall be passed with a minimum mark of 18; a mark of 30 may be accompanied by honours by a unanimous vote of the Board. Examinations are marked out of 30 or with a simple pass mark. Assessments following tests other than examinations are marked out with a simple pass mark.

6. Oral exams are open to the public. If written tests are scheduled, the candidate has the right to see his/her paper(s) after correction.
7. The University Didactic Regulations govern Examination Boards <sup>8</sup>.

## **Art. 9**

### **Degree Program structure and Study Plan**

1. The legal duration of the Degree Program is 3 years. The student must acquire 180 CFU<sup>9</sup>, attributable to the following Types of Training Activities (TAF):
  - A) basic: 66 cfu
  - B) characterising: 78 cfu,
  - C) related or complementary: 18 cfu
  - D) at the student's choice<sup>10</sup>: 12 cfu
  - E) for the final exam: 5 cfu
  - F) further training activities: 1 cfu.
2. The degree is awarded after having acquired 180 CFU by passing examinations, not exceeding 20 including the final exam and the performance of other training activities.

Unless otherwise provided for in the legal framework of University studies, examinations taken as part of basic, characterising, and related or supplementary activities, as well as activities chosen autonomously by the student (TAF D) are taken into consideration for counting purposes. Examinations or assessments relating to activities independently chosen by the student may be taken into account in the overall calculation corresponding to one unit<sup>11</sup>. Tests constituting an assessment of suitability for the activities referred to in Article 10, paragraph 5, letters c), d) and e) of Ministerial Decree 270/2004<sup>12</sup> are excluded from the count. Integrated Courses comprising of two or more modules are subject to a single examination.

3. In order to acquire the CFU relating to independent choice activities, the student is free to choose among all the Courses offered by the University, provided that they are consistent with the training project. This consistency is assessed by the Didactic Coordination Commission. Also, for the acquisition of the CFU relating to autonomous choice activities, the "passing the exam or other form of profit verification" is required (Art. 5, c. 4 of Ministerial Decree 270/2004).
4. The study plan summarises the structure of the Degree Program, listing the envisaged teachings broken down by course year and, in case, by curriculum. At the end, the propedeuticities envisaged by the Degree Program are listed. The study plan offered to students, with an indication of the scientific-disciplinary sectors and the area to which they belong, of the credits, of the type of educational activity, is set out in Annex 1 to these Didactic Regulations.
5. Pursuant to Art. 11, paragraph 4-bis, of Ministerial Decree 270/2004, it is possible to obtain the Degree according to an individual study plan that also includes educational activities different from those specified in the Didactic Regulations, as long as they are consistent with the CdS detail sheet of the academic year of enrollment. The individual study plan is approved by the Subcommission.

## **Art. 10**

### **Attendance requirements<sup>13</sup>**

1. In general, attendance of lectures is strongly recommended but not compulsory. In the case of individual courses with compulsory attendance, this option is indicated in the relative teaching/activity course sheet available in Annex 2.
2. If the lecturer envisages a different syllabus modulation for attending and non-attending students, this is indicated in the individual Course details published on the CdS web page and on the teacher's UniNA website.
3. Attendance at seminar activities that award training credits is compulsory. The relative modalities for the attribution of CFU are the responsibility of the CCD.

## **Art. 11**

### **Prerequisites and prior knowledge**

1. The list of incoming and outgoing propedeuticities (necessary to sit a particular examination) can be found at the end of Annex 1 and in the teaching/activity course sheet (Annex 2).
2. Any prior knowledge deemed necessary is indicated in the individual Teaching Schedule published on the course webpage and on the teacher's UniNA website.

## **Art. 12**

### **Degree Program Calendar**

The Degree Program calendar can be found on the Department's website well before the start of the activities (Art. 21, c. 5 of the RDA).

## **Art. 13**

### **Criteria for the recognition of credits earned in other Degree Programs in the same Class<sup>14</sup>**

For students coming from Degree Programs of the same Class, the Didactic Coordination Commission ensures the full recognition of CFU, when associated with activities that are culturally

compatible with the training Degree Program, acquired by the student at the originating Degree Program, according to the criteria outlined in Article 14 below. Failure to recognise credits must be adequately justified. It is without prejudice to the fact that the number of credits relating to the same scientific-disciplinary sector directly recognised by the student may not be less than 50% of those previously achieved.

## **Article 14**

### **Criteria for the recognition of credits acquired in Degree Programs of different classes, in university or university-level Degree Programs, through single courses, at online Universities and in international Degree Programs<sup>15</sup>; criteria for the recognition of credits acquired in extra-curricular activities**

1. With regard to the criteria for the recognition of CFU acquired in Degree Programs of different Classes, in university or university-level Degree Programs, through single courses, at online Universities and in International Degree Programs, the credits acquired are recognised by the CCD on the basis of the following criteria:

- analysis of the activities carried out;
- evaluation of the congruity of the disciplinary scientific sectors and of the contents of the training activities in which the student has earned credits with the specific training objectives of the Degree Program and of the individual training activities to be recognised.

Recognition is carried out up to the number of credits envisaged by the didactic system of the Degree Program. Failure to recognise credits must be adequately justified. Pursuant to Art. 5, c. 5-bis, of Ministerial Decree 270/2004, it is also possible to acquire CFU at other Italian universities on the basis of agreements established between the concerned institutions, in accordance with the regulations current at the time <sup>16</sup>.

2. Any recognition of CFU relating to examinations passed as single courses may take place within the limit of 36 CFU, upon request of the interested party and following the approval of the CCD. Recognition may not contribute to the reduction of the legal duration of the Degree Program, as determined by Art. 8, c. 2 of Ministerial Decree 270/2004, except for students who enrol while already in possession of a degree of the same level<sup>17</sup>.

3. With regard to the criteria for the recognition of CFU acquired in extra-curricular activities, within the limit of 12 CFU the following activities may be recognised:

- Professional knowledge, skills, and certified skills, taking into account the congruence of the activity carried out and/or of the certified skill with the aims and objectives of the Degree Program as well as the hourly commitment of the duration of the activity.
- Knowledge and skills acquired in post-secondary-level training activities, which the University contributed to developing and implementing.

## **Art. 15**

### **Criteria for enrolment in individual teaching courses**

Enrolment in individual teaching courses, provided for by the University Didactic Regulations<sup>18</sup>, is governed by the "University Regulations for enrolment in individual teaching courses activated as part of the Degree Program"<sup>19</sup>.

## **Article 16**

### **Features and modalities for the final examination**

The final examination is a public discussion before a specific commission of a written paper, which is an important demonstration of the student's cultural maturity as well as their ability to process information autonomously and critically. The topic is usually agreed upon with one of the Degree Program's lecturers. The thesis will address a topic consistent with one of the basic, characterizing, related, or integrative scientific-disciplinary sectors, and in any case, aligned with the educational objectives of the degree. In the paper, the student reports the knowledge acquired on the topic agreed upon with the lecturer, demonstrating the ability to critically process information gathered from research on the collected bibliographic data. The oral discussion before the commission will also take place in the two foreign languages chosen by each student at the beginning of their course. To be admitted to the final exam, the student must have acquired the number of university credits foreseen by the Didactic Regulations, minus those required for the final exam.

## **Article 17**

### **Guidelines for traineeship and internship**

1. Students enrolled in the Degree Program may decide to carry out internships or training periods with organisations or companies that have an agreement with the University. Traineeship and internship are not compulsory and contribute to the award of credits for the other training activities chosen by the student and included in the study plan, as provided for by Art. 10, par. 5, letters d and e, of Ministerial Decree 270/2004<sup>20</sup>.
2. The CCD regulates the modalities and characteristics of traineeship and internship with specific regulations.
3. The University of Naples Federico II, through the CCD and the Responsible of the Job Placement, ensures constant contact with the world of work to offer students and graduates of the University concrete opportunities for internships and work experience and to promote their professional integration.

## **Article**

## **18**

### **Disqualification of student status<sup>21</sup>**

A student who has not taken any examinations for eight consecutive academic years incurs forfeiture unless his/her contract stipulates otherwise. In any case, forfeiture shall be notified to the student by certified e-mail or other suitable means attesting to its receipt.

## **Article 19**

### **Teaching tasks, including supplementary teaching, guidance, and tutoring activities**

1. Professors and researchers carry out the teaching load assigned to them in accordance with the provisions of the RDA and the Regulations on the teaching and student service duties of professors and researchers and on the procedures for self-certification and verification of actual performance<sup>22</sup>.

2. Professors and researchers must guarantee at least two hours of reception every 15 days (or by appointment in any case granted no longer than 15 days) and, in any case, guarantee availability by e-mail.
3. The tutoring service has the task of orienting and assisting students throughout their studies and of removing the obstacles that prevent them from adequately benefiting from attending courses, also through initiatives tailored to the needs and aptitudes of individuals.
4. The University ensures guidance, tutoring and assistance services and activities to welcome and support students. These activities are organised by the Schools and/or Departments under the coordination of the University, as established by the RDA in Article 8.

## **Article 20**

### **Evaluation of the quality of the activities performed**

1. The Didactic Coordination Commission implements all the quality assessment forms of teaching activities envisaged by the regulations in force according to the indications provided by the University Quality Presidium.
2. In order to guarantee the quality of teaching to the students and to identify the needs of the students and all stakeholders, the University of Naples Federico II uses the Quality Assurance (QA)<sup>23</sup> System, developed in accordance with the document "Self-evaluation, Evaluation and Accreditation of the Italian University System" of ANVUR, using:
  - surveys on the degree of placement of graduates into the world of work and on post-graduate needs;
  - data extracted from the administration of the questionnaire to assess student satisfaction for each course in the curriculum, with questions relating to the way the course is conducted, teaching materials, teaching aids, organisation, facilities.

The requirements deriving from the analysis of student satisfaction data, discussed, and analysed by the Teaching Coordination Committee and the Joint Teachers' and Students' Committee (CPDS), are included among the input data in the service design process and/or among the quality objectives.

3. The QA System developed by the University implements a process of continuous improvement of the objectives and of the appropriate tools to achieve them, ensuring that planning, monitoring, and self-assessment processes are activated in all the structures to allow the prompt detection of problems, their adequate investigation, and the design of possible solutions.

## **Article 21**

### **Final Rules**

The Department Council, on the proposal of the CCD, submits any proposals to amend and/or supplement these Rules for consideration by the Academic Senate.

## **Article 22**

### **Publicity and Entry into Force**

1. These Rules and Regulations shall enter into force on the day following their publication on the University's official notice board; they shall also be published on the University website. The same forms and methods of publicity shall be used for subsequent amendments and additions.
